Introduction to the Liturgy of the Word:

First Reading: Genesis 15:5-12, 17-18: In a holy covenant, God promises Abram a homeland.

Psalm 27: "The Lord is my light and my salvation."

Philippians 3:17-4:1: Christ will change our lowly body to conform with His glorified body. Gospel: Luke 9:28b-36: His face changed in appearance and His clothes became dazzling white.

Two dramatic scenes are narrated to us today. First, God seals the covenant with Abram by appearing as smoke and fire and passing between the animals Abram had sacrificed as a sign of his covenant with God. In the Gospel, Jesus is transfigured in glory, His face and clothing changing in appearance and dazzling the three apostles who witnessed it. Adding to the drama, God the Father speaks from the cloud that envelops them all, saying, "This is my chosen Son; listen to him." Let us now listen to the word of God.

Journey Through the Bible: The Final Testament of Moses (Deuteronomy 1-34)

This commentary is adapted from Little Rock Scripture Study's "Panorama of the Old Testament."

The final book of the Pentateuch is Deuteronomy. The setting is the plains of Moab across the Jordan River, with the Israelites encamped and on the verge of entering the Promised Land. Moses will not enter the land with them, but will die here. Most of the book takes the form of several eloquent speeches given by Moses to the people on the eve of his death. The book is a restatement, explanation, and further development of much of the Pentateuch. By reminding the Israelites of their past and preparing them for the future, he urges them to be faithful to the covenant.

In his first speech (Deuteronomy 1-4), Moses reviews the events of the past forty years, from Mount Sinai to the present moment. He tells the new generation of the important lessons learned from the experiences of their parents' generation. The future well-being of God's people will depend on loving and serving God from the heart.

The second address (Deuteronomy 5-28) is a restatement and expansion of God's commandments with applications for their future in the land. Following in the way of the covenant is the way to love God with your whole being. The *Shema* forms their daily prayer.

"Hear, O Israel! The LORD is your God, the LORD alone! Therefore, you shall love the LORD, your God, with your whole heart, and with all your whole being, and with your whole strength." (Deuteronomy 6:4)

In addressing the new generation, Moses urges them to "remember." By remembering, God's people form an identity. By remembering, the past becomes real in the present, and life can be lived more faithfully and genuinely. The moment that is most important for the book of Deuteronomy is not the past; it is "this day." The critical time for every person is "today."

"This day the LORD, your God, is commanding you to observe these statutes and ordinances. Be careful, then, to observe them with all your whole heart and with your whole being." (Deuteronomy 26:16)

The final address of Moses before his death (Deuteronomy 29-33) presents the Israelites with the choice that will determine their future.

"I have set before you life and death, the blessing and the curse. Choose life, then, that you and your descendants may live, by loving the LORD, your God, obeying His voice, and holding fast to Him." (Deuteronomy 30:19)

After appointing Joshua as his successor, Moses goes up to Mount Nebo and looks out upon the Promised Land that he will not enter, knowing that a new generation will live in that land. Then Moses dies and is buried on the mountain. He was the leader of the people, a mediator before God, a wonderworker, teacher and Israel's greatest prophet. The Torah, given to Israel through Moses, would form the foundation of Israel's life through the centuries.




